Lincoln County Free Fair - General Rules

Section 1: Interpretation, Amendments, and Violations

1. The Lincoln County Fair Board reserves the right to interpret these rules and regulations and arbitrarily settle all questions arising in connection with the free fair that shall be held under the management of this board.
2. The management reserves the right to amend or add to these rules as they, in their judgment, deem it advisable. In the event of a conflict of general rules and special rules, the latter will govern.
3. Any person who violates any general or special rule will forfeit all privileges and premiums and be subject to such penalty as the Fair Board may determine.
4. Fair Board will make the final decision regarding awarding premiums.
5. No claim for injury to person or property shall be asserted, maintained, or initiated suit against the Lincoln County Fair Board, its officers or agents, representatives or employees on behalf of any person or entity as a result of damage sustained on the Lincoln County Fairgrounds.

Section 2: Entry Requirements

1. Rules are specific for each species
2. All entries to the County Fair are free, but no unworthy entry will be received for exhibit.
3. All property of any character entered at the fair for any purpose shall be subject to control of the secretary or superintendent in charge.
4. Separate entry must be provided for each exhibit. Entry forms will be provided for listing all entries; Exhibitors are responsible for making sure entries are properly listed.
5. Entries must have been prepared or produced since the last Lincoln County fair, with the exception of livestock.
6. Exhibitors may enter only one exhibit in each class listed in the fair book—to include Rabbits and Chickens with the exception of livestock. Exhibitors may exhibit 3 barrows, 3 market steers, 3 prospect steers, 3 market lambs, 3 market goats, 3 does, 2 breeding gilts per class, 2 ewes per class, and 2 heifers per class.
7. All breeding stock must be accompanied by ORIGINAL registration papers in the name of the exhibitor. Copies (paper or on electronic device) will NOT be accepted. Proof from the breed association that papers are in process will be sufficient, provided the birthday & tattoo number match are detailed in the letter AND the date of transfer meets the ownership guidelines listed in Section 4 herein.
8. All breeding beef and dairy animals must have legible tattoos, and the tattoo must match the registration papers.
9. No paint, coloring or adhesive may be applied to beef, dairy, sheep, goat or swine entries. Swine may be washed and shown with water only as a dressing.
10. All exhibits must be claimed by 5:00pm on Monday. Items remaining after 5pm Monday will be disposed of at the discretion of the Lincoln County Fair Board.
11. No exhibits will be released until the fair is complete, except as stated in the rules or schedule.
12. Food Preparation Department exhibits should be entered on Wednesday 6:30pm-8:30pm OR Thursday, 8:00am-1:00pm. Entries not placing may be released after judging.
13. All facilities at the fair will close at 9:00pm and no one will be allowed in the commercial exhibits or trade show buildings before 8:30am.
14. Open Classes: You must be a resident of Lincoln County to exhibit at the fair, unless specifically provided under the rules related to a division or specific event.
17. Pee-Wee Division is for exhibitors ages 8 and under only and not enrolled in 4-H. If assistance is required, only an active Junior exhibitor may assist, with only minimal assistance allowed.
18. Junior Divisions: You must be a resident OR attend school in Lincoln County to exhibit in the Junior Divisions.
19. For all junior division exhibits, the age of the contestant must meet State 4-H membership guidelines or FFA guidelines.
20. The following Academic Eligibility Guidelines must be followed:
 - a) Youth who have been declared ineligible to participate in extracurricular activities by their local school administrators will be declared ineligible to participate in this show.
 - b) Youth who are eligible on the first day of the show will be considered eligible for the duration of the show.

Similarly, youth who are ineligible on the first day of the show will be considered ineligible for the duration of the show.

- c) If an exhibitor is ineligible to participate in the show for any reason, including rules of the OSSAA, the animals owned by the exhibitor are also ineligible for the show.
 - d) Ineligible youth who participate in the show will forfeit ALL show awards & premiums and will be subject to disciplinary action as provided by the local school policies.
 - e) It will be the responsibility of the local school administration to notify the students' family AND the show management if a particular student is ineligible to participate.
21. No animal may be shown in more than one division.
22. Dress code:
- **4-H Members:** (a) must wear a collared shirt in the appropriate colors of solid green, solid white, or a mix of green /white, with no 3rd color (b) must have an official 4-H emblem of at least 2 ½" affixed to the front, left side (c) no hats or caps allowed in the show ring.
 - **FFA Members:** (a) must wear a collared shirt in the appropriate colors of solid blue, solid yellow, or a mix of blue/yellow, with no 3rd color (b) must have an official FFA emblem of at least 2 ½" affixed to the front, left side (c) no hats or caps allowed in the show ring.

Section 3: Show Ring Code of Ethics

The Lincoln County Fair Board lists herein practices which are considered unacceptable in presenting livestock in the show ring. The use of these practices is, therefore, considered unethical and grounds for removal from the Lincoln County Fair.

1. Misrepresentation of the age of the animal for the class in which it is shown.
2. Treating or massaging any part of the body (internally or externally) with an irritant or other substance to straighten a weak back or loin, or to produce unnatural animation.
3. Minimize "crampness" or lack of soundness by feeding or injecting drugs, depressants, or applying packs, or using any artificial means or treatment beyond normal exercise.
4. Striking the animal to cause swelling in a depressed area or insertion of foreign material under the skin to alter the animal's natural appearance.
5. Surgery of any kind to change the natural contour or appearance of the animal's body, hide or hair. Not included in this rule is the removal of teats and horns, clipping and dressing of hair, and trimming of hooves.
6. Any attempt to change breed characteristics of an animal by changing the color of hair, fleece or skin at any point, spot or area of the animal's body.
7. The use of alcoholic beverages in the feed or administered as a drench.
8. Administration of any drug internally or externally prior to entering the show ring, except for treating a recognized disease or injury. The term "drug" shall apply to any substance in which the sale, possession or use is controlled by license under federal, state or local laws or regulations and any substance commonly used by the medical or veterinary professions which affect the circulatory, respiratory, or central nervous system.
9. Balancing the udder by any abnormal means, including the use of a mechanical contrivance or the injection of fluid or drugs; setting the teats and/or occluding (sealing the ends) with a mechanical contrivance or the use of a chemical; treating or massaging the udder or its attachments with an irritant or counter-irritant. The use of common products such as fly spray, ointment, or liniment in excess to the extent that it is irritating is included as an "irritant" unless required to reduce edema at the time of calving.
10. Criticizing or interfering with the judge, exhibitors, or show officials before, during, or after the event/show may result in an individual or group being expelled, placed on probation, declared ineligible or barred from exhibiting at the event or future events.
11. No individuals will be allowed in the showing except for those in an official capacity who have been authorized by the Fair Superintendent.
12. Sideline coaching during the livestock show should be kept to a minimum, so as not to distract other exhibitors or interfere with any animals. Sideline coaching during Showmanship competitions is not permitted. Showmanship contests are for the exhibitors to compete based on their own abilities. No other exhibitors or adults are permitted to give advice during the competition. Violators may be asked to leave and could cause the exhibitor to be disqualified.
13. Any violation of these rules will result in the exhibitor and/or the livestock involved being disqualified. Further, any premium monies or awards will be returned to the Fair Board. Any exhibitor found violating these rules may be deemed ineligible to exhibit in the future at the Lincoln County Fair or Spring Livestock Show. Disciplinary actions taken by the Fair Board will be final.

Section 4: Exhibitor Duties and Privileges

1. Exhibits must be owned by the exhibitor for at least the following timeframes:
Market Steers 90 days; Heifers, Market Barrows & Gilts, Market Weathers & Ewes, Market Goats 60 days; Prospect Steers, Breeding Gilts, Breeding Ewes & Does 30 days.
2. All other exhibits must have been produced in Lincoln County BY EXHIBITOR during the year since the last Lincoln County Fair, provided that citizens of school districts overlapping into other counties are eligible to compete in the Lincoln County Fair.
3. Each exhibitor is expected to care for and groom their animals throughout the show. He or she may be assisted by their family members, Ag Instructor, County Extension Educator, and other eligible exhibitors from their respective county or chapter. The official 4-H Certified Volunteer Leader for a local/county group will be permitted to assist the youth under his or her supervision. An official 4-H Certified Volunteer must be designated by the County Extension Professionals, have an official 4-H Volunteer enrollment form on file in the County Extension office and be available to assist all youth under his or her supervision. The exhibitor must be present and assist with and/or grooming his/her animal in preparation for showing. Exhibitors, Parents, Ext. Educators, Ag Ed Instructors are encouraged to assist in enforcing this rule by filing a formal protest in cases of rule violation.
4. Livestock stalls will be assigned at the time of entry. **Exhibitors shall always keep such spaces or stalls in clean condition during the fair.** Alleys are to be kept clear; no feeding in wash rack or alley. Exhibitors who fail to clean the area to the satisfaction of the Fair Board will be subject to forfeiture of all awards and premiums AND will jeopardize future participation privileges in fairs/livestock shows/premium auctions.
7. All junior exhibitors will be allowed to show in showmanship in their appropriate age group in all species. Exhibitors must have an animal entered in that show in order to show in Showmanship for that species. Showmanship competition will immediately follow the conclusion of their species in beef, dairy, sheep, goat & swine shows.
Junior: 3rd – 6th grade; Intermediate: 7th – 9th grade; Senior: 10th – 12th grade
8. Any member of the Fair Board shall have access to all premises of any character on the fairgrounds or concessions at any time during the fair.
9. If it be ascertained that any exhibitor has made or caused to be made any false statement in regard to any exhibit or if any exhibitor, or his agent, shall attempt to interfere with the judges in the performing of their duties, he shall be excluded from all competition or exhibition on the grounds of the association of any fair and any awards that he may have received may be forfeited at the direction of the Board.
10. The decision of the judges shall be final, and no appeal will be considered except in case of protest. No interference with judges will be allowed during judging.
11. All exhibits in the Hobbies, Arts and Crafts must be in large part, made or assembled by the exhibitor.
12. Exhibitors must exhibit their own livestock unless otherwise granted permission by superintendent in charge, except for an exhibitor having two animals in one class or in Grand drive.
13. All nursing cows must be stalled outside.
14. **ANY 4-H/FFA CATEGORY THAT IS DESIGNATED AT THE STATE FAIR WILL BE AVAILABLE TO JR EXHIBITORS AT LINCOLN COUNTY, even if it is not specified in this document.**
16. **ANY CATEGORY AVAILABLE FOR ADULTS/OPEN EXHIBITORS WILL ALSO BE AVAILABLE AS A JUNIOR CATEGORY.**

Section 5. Protests

1. Any protest must be made in writing, signed and accompanied by a **\$100 cash deposit**, which will be forfeited if the protest is not sustained. Protest must be filed with the general superintendent, within **one (1) hour** of the completion of the show for the given species being protested. All decisions of the Fair Board will be final.
2. The Fair Board reserves the final and absolute right to determine all questions regarding the awarding premiums.
3. In addition to the right to protest herein granted exhibitors, the Fair Board reserves the right to take recognizance of fraud, consummated or attempted in connection with any exhibit, and take action, as they may deem advisable

Section 6. Powers and Liabilities of the Lincoln County Fair Board

1. The LCFB will use every precaution to guard against extortion in any form on fairgrounds and any violation of this rule shall result in forfeiture of every privilege, contract or money paid in, and expulsion from the grounds.

2. The LCFB reserves the right to remove from the grounds any exhibit, animal, concession or show that may be objectionable, to remove any sign, banner, identification mark or signature, or advertising matter of any kind deemed objectionable.
3. No diseased animal or fowl will be permitted to be exhibited or occupy space at the fair, and every precaution will be taken to enforce this rule. However, the LCFB will not be responsible for any loss or damage that may be sustained by anyone through violation of this rule.
4. No claim for any injury to any person or property shall be asserted or a suit instituted or maintained against the Lincoln County Fair Board, its officers or agents, representatives, servants, or employees on behalf of any person, corporation or firms because of damage sustained on the grounds of this fair.
5. LCFB will not be responsible for accidents to animals or exhibitors and reserves the right to reject unworthy or diseased animals. All cattle and horses must be broke to lead and be under control by exhibitor during the show and must be presented in a showman-like manner. If animals do not meet this requirement, LCFB will ask that said animal be removed from the fairgrounds for the protection of the other exhibitors and spectators.
6. Any horse deemed unsafe and/or unmanageable may be removed from the show ring/fairgrounds at the discretion of the judge, horse show superintendent and/or the LCFB.

Section 7. Premiums and Awards

1. The following-colored ribbons shall be used in designating awards:

Champion:	Purple	Fourth:	Pink
First:	Blue	Fifth:	Yellow
Second:	Red	Sixth:	Green
Third:	White		

These ribbons will be attached only by the Superintendent or his/her assistant

2. Premium amounts are set as follows, unless otherwise noted in specific categories:
1st Place: \$3; 2nd Place: \$2; 3rd Place: \$1
3. Where there is no competition, judges shall award first, second, or third premium prize according to the merits of the article. No premium shall be awarded an unworthy exhibit.
4. Grand and Reserve Grand Champions will be awarded for Pee-Wee, Open & Junior Breeding division in Beef, Dairy, Sheep, Goat & Swine shows. Crossbred Champions will be eligible to show for Grand and Reserve Grand Champion in breeding divisions.
5. Anyone removing animals from the Fairgrounds during the show will forfeit all awards and premiums. In addition, those exhibitors will forfeit all privileges in future fairs and/or spring livestock shows & premium auctions. Animals that need to be removed for health concerns must be approved for release by LCFB, General Manager, or the appropriate species Superintendent at the recommendation of a licensed, practicing veterinarian.
6. FFA Instructors and 4-H Leaders will be notified when Premium checks are ready for pickup.

Section 8. Miscellaneous

1. All rights that are applicable shall be made part of all contracts made with concessionaires.
2. A superintendent and one assistant will be appointed for each department, whose duty it shall be to receive the exhibits, properly classify them and to assist the judges.
3. No dogs shall be allowed on the premises during the Lincoln County Fair, except for properly documented service animals.
4. Any suggestions for improving the Fair should be put in writing and given to a Lincoln County Fair Board member **PRIOR TO MARCH 1st** of the year of the Fair. LCFB will consider suggestions when setting guidelines for the upcoming Fair. **The public is welcome to attend monthly Fair Board meetings but are only allowed to speak during the Public Participation portion. Each person is limited to 2 minutes to address the Board. Decisions of the LCFB are final.**

1. County winners (excluding bread machine class) will receive awards from the Oklahoma Wheat Commission.
2. **Recipes winning first place at the 2025 State Contest are ineligible to be used in 2025 contest.**
3. Each entry must be prepared and baked by the person whose name is on the entry form.
4. The same person may not win Champion, Reserve Champion or Bread Machine Class. Two separate people should win, unless entries do not offer that selection.
5. **Duplicate recipes may not be entered by different family members in any class or division.**
6. Recipe must accompany entry at county and state level. Entries that are eligible to compete at state level will provide 2 recipes – one at county fair (which will be emailed to Commission office by County Extension Educator) and bring one with entry at state competition.
7. Whole Wheat Bread Class #I65 – This category will include only the use of whole wheat flour and/or whole white wheat flour. **No** All-purpose or Bread flour included in this category. Dough enhancers, vital wheat gluten and whole grains, in addition to whole wheat, are permissible.
8. Dinner rolls should consist of three (3) rolls per entry. Any shape acceptable.
9. Specialty Shapes Class #I74 – Let your imagination go: animals, people, objects, etc. **All garnishes must be edible.** Twists and Star Breads should be entered in the “other wheat bread” or “sweet bread” category and NOT in “specialty shapes”.
10. The OTHER WHEAT BREADS, class #'s 67 and 72 will include other breads made with yeast such as cheese, French onion, sourdough, challah, etc. **NO QUICK BREADS** unless yeast is used as a leavening agent. (All breads must use yeast as a leavening agent.)
11. “Best of Wheat”, formerly Wheat hearts, sponsored Bread Baking Contest is to be judged separately from the county fair open class division.
12. County Champion and Reserve Champion from each division are eligible for state competition (see exception below) at the State Fair of Oklahoma - September 2023.
13. One (1) Bread Machine entry from each division, Class 580-6 and Class 580-12, determined by county judge, will be eligible for competition at state level. Bread machine entries will not be eligible for County Champion or Reserve Champion at county level or eligible for Grand Champion at State level or silver tray award. 1st – 5th place ribbons will be awarded to the bread machine class in both divisions at the state competition. If any part of the recipe is done with a bread machine, then the recipe will be classified in the bread machine category.
